# GOSPEL Matthew 16:13-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" And they said, "Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." "But you," he said, "who do you say I am?" Then Simon Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ," he said, "the Son of the living God." Jesus replied, "Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven." Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.

THE WORD

Year A • Psalter Week 1



Today's Gospel is one of the most dramatic in Matthew. Jesus has been with his disciples for some time. They have listened to him speak and preach; they have watched him perform great miracles.

Now Jesus wants to see if they have come to realise just who he really is. He asks them, "Who do people say I am?" The disciples give him a variety of answers. "Some think you are John the Baptist, some Elijah, others Jeremiah or one of the prophets." And then comes Jesus' pointed question. "But you," he asks them, "who do you say that I am?"

It is Peter who answers for all of them: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living  $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$ ."

Jesus congratulates Peter on getting the answer right, and tells him that he is going to be the rock upon which the Church will be built.

Jesus' pointed question was not asked just of the disciples that day in Caesarea Philippi two thousand years ago. It has been central for Christians ever since the resurrection. It is asked of us today too: Who do we say Jesus is? Who is Jesus for us? Our answer to that question is absolutely crucial because it will tell us an awful lot about the kind of people we are.

If we acknowledge Jesus as the Christ, if Jesus is for us the way, the truth and the life, then that must shape and form the lives we lead, the values we live by, the decisions we make, the very order of our lives. ■

### SAY

"Lord, I know you are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

### DO

Reflect on your faith and on your relationship with Jesus. Imagine that Jesus is asking you the very same question that he put to his disciples that day in Caesarea Philippi. Who do you say Jesus is?

# LEARN

The Christian experience, Pope Francis emphasises, is with the person of Jesus, not a series of philosophical teachings. It is an experience, not an idea; a relationship, not a line of arguments or contention. It is not enough to know who Jesus is; we must have a personal relationship with him.

Jesus chose Peter to be the first Pope. The popes are the successors of St Peter.

Jesus assures us that whatever happens, his Church will go on. The gates of hell shall never prevail against it.

# PRAY

Take some time today to pray for Pope Francis. He faces many challenges, including strong opposition from elements in the Church. Ask the Lord to help him in his difficult task. Thank the Lord for him.



# REFLECT

esus asked them the safe question first, the easy question: "Who do others say that I am?" It was safe and easy because to answer it required no commitment and no risk. All it requires to answer a safe question is a bit of curiosity, and some straight reporting.

Asking the easy question was Jesus' way of teeing up the hard question, the one he really wanted to ask, the personal question: "OK, that's what other people

say, but who do you, my closest friends, say that I am?" And Peter got the answer right: "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

Throughout our lives as Catholics we hear a lot about Jesus. We listen to homilies about him every Sunday, we read books about him and leaflets such as this one; we may remember what we were taught about him in school all those years ago. All of this is good, but Jesus' question in

today's Gospel goes beyond all that. He doesn't want to know what we have read or heard other people say about him; he's not interested in their views. He wants to know our views, what we individually have to say about him. He is asking each of us to answer that question personally and honestly for ourselves.

That's a risky question because our answer will shape the people we are and how we live. ■
